"Fateful Days, Fateful Journey: The Story of Physicist Klaus Fuchs"

In 1931, Klaus Fuchs was a mathematics-physics student at the University of Kiel. Starting at a young age, he dedicated himself to science; by the time he entered the University, he was equally dedicated to confronting National Socialist students. In doing so he became a committed communist. These ideals carried him from Germany in 1933 to Bristol, England and stayed with him at Los Alamos where he was instrumental in designing the atomic bomb. In 1950, as the head of theoretical physics at Harwell, the British nuclear research center, he was arrested for providing top secret information to the Soviet Union. His early days in Kiel were the catalyst for his future.

*Nancy Greenspan is the author of 'The End of the Certain World: The Life and Science of Max Born. She is now writing a biography of Klaus Fuchs, who was a student of Born's. She has traveled from internment camps to nuclear facilities and countless archives, gathering information. In addition to the history of science, she has published extensively in the fields of child development and health economics. Ms. Greenspan lives in Bethesda, Maryland.
